Our attendance rate is averaging 78% at the moment. On any day 58-65 students are away. This is the equivalent of two to three classes every day. There are many reasons for this - sickness, tangi, appointments etc. There are 13 students who attend less than 50% of the time. I have noticed many of the students who are away often return to school and become disengaged with the learning because the rest of the class have moved on with their learning and their friendships and moved on socially and emotionally.

Our students are very good at including returning students but, for many students with high absences, it gets harder and harder to return to school and engage with learning and with their teacher and friends. Just getting up and coming to school becomes very difficult.

There is no one way of getting students to attend school but I know when I ask the regular attending students, the main reasons they attend are because

- I don't know, I just want to do it
- I like playing with my friends
- mum said

Whatever the reason your child comes to school, we are privileged to have them here. Windley School is a safe place for your child to learn.

Positive Behaviour for Learning PB4L

The school expectations are

- Kia Tūpato/be safe
- Kia whakaute/be respectful
- Kia Takohanga/be responsible

Each fortnight we have a focus for PB4L. This fortnight is, keep to task by staying focused. All classes teach what this looks like, sounds like, what behaviours promote this focus. After the lesson the teacher rewards and gives positive feedback around this focus. At the end of the fortnight Windley School has a PB4L assembly to promote the focus and give certificates to students who have been demonstrating the focus well. Ask your child about the expectations and what that might look like, sound like, and feel like at home. Each home may have different ways of showing the expectations.
